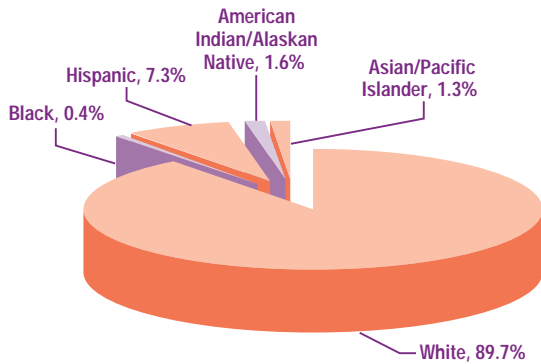

Incidence and Mortality



- The incidence rate of cervical cancer in Idaho, 6.9/100,000, is lower than the national average of 9.2/100,000.
- The mortality rate of cervical cancer in Idaho, 2.8/100,000, is slightly higher than the national average of 2.7/100,000.

Healthcare Access & Utilization

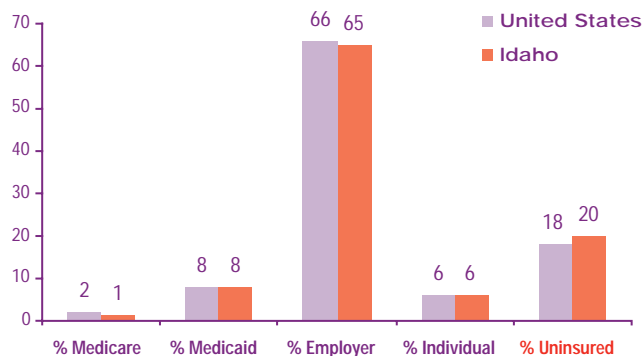
- 78.4% of women reported being screened for cervical cancer in the past 3 years.
- Idaho Medicaid offers coverage of HPV testing without restriction.
- Idaho mandates that health insurers allow women access to OB/GYNs without a referral from their primary care provider (PCP) and they also mandate that insurers allow OB/GYNs to be designated as a woman's PCP.

Total Scoring: 6 out of 16 points (38%)

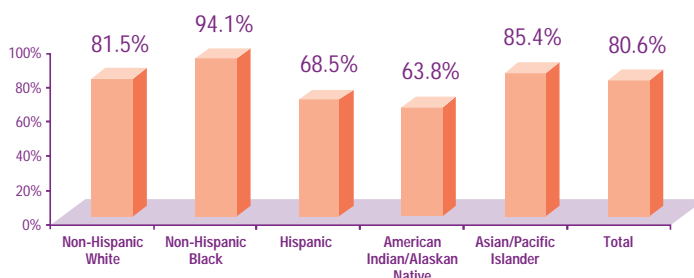

Policy Initiatives & Infrastructure

- **Coverage mandates for cervical cancer screening**
 - Idaho does not have legislation in place mandating for coverage of Pap testing.
- **Task force/commissions for cervical cancer prevention**
 - Idaho does not have legislation in place for a Cervical Cancer Elimination Task Force.
- **Miscellaneous support of cervical cancer prevention**
 - Idaho does not have any other legislation in place for cervical cancer prevention.

Data Collection and Tracking

- Idaho maintains high quality cancer data and has one of the nation's best cancer registry programs.

Statewide Prevention Programs

- Women's Health Check, in conjunction with healthcare providers around the state, helps women overcome the barriers of cost and education. Eligible women are over the age of 50, not eligible for Medicare Part B, have no insurance covering Pap test, and have incomes at or below 200% of the federal poverty level.

Idaho Breast and Cervical Cancer Alliance (IBCCA) is a coalition of professionals -- healthcare and insurance providers, physicians, survivors, and health educators -- working together to move forward in the fight against breast and cervical cancer through a team-based, cooperative approach.
